

Sergio Noto was born in Verona on January 10th, 1959. He studied classical subjects at Scipione Maffei Liceo in Verona and graduated (cum Laude) in Philosophy from the Università Cattolica del Sacro Cuore in Milan. He also attended and graduated from the School of Paleography and Archive Studies at the State Archives in Milan. In 1984, he served as a officer in the Alpine Military School in Aosta and later in the Belluno Battalion in the Alpine troops.

In 1987, he was awarded a research grant at the Institute of Economic and Social History at the University of Verona, under the supervision of Professor Gino Barbieri, to study the history of economic thought. Professor Barbieri, the well-known founder of the University of Verona, was his last mentor. In a gesture of affection, S. N. received the personal papers of the great economic historian upon his death. After Professor Barbieri's passing, he furthered his education in Economics, studying at NYU under the supervision of Israel Kirzner, George Mason University, and the Institute für Weltwirtschaft in Kiel. In 1992, he secured a tenured research position in Economic History at the Faculty of Economics at the University of Verona.

Since 1992, he has been married to Wenche Opheim, and they have four daughters: Marta, Alma, Eloisa, and Rachele Carolina.

From 1992, his interest in economic thought was reignited through the study of economic liberalism, particularly that of Hayek. He later focused on Italian economists of the 1930s and 40s. Lately, he has been particularly interested in corporatist theory and the economic history of corporatism. His scientific contributions include economists such as Angelo Messedaglia, Alberto de' Stefani, and liberal thinkers like Alessandro Passerin d'Entreves. His interests in this field have expanded to the works of Joseph Schumpeter and twentieth-century corporatism, leading him to explore the archives of Stanford and Chicago universities.

He has lectured at various universities, conferences, and within the Erasmus Program's Teaching Staff Mobility Programs, initiating and coordinating exchange programs with universities in Odense (DK), Erlangen-Nürnberg, Oslo, and Zaragoza. He collaborates with several journals as a referee and served as a Visiting Professor in the spring of 2010 at the University Paris 2 Panthéon, teaching the History of Economic Thought. He has been a member of the doctoral programs in Economic History (Verona) and History of Economic Thought (Macerata).

He is a member of ESHET and several Italian scientific associations. Fluent in English, he also has a good knowledge of German and Norwegian (Bokmål). Since 2000, he has been a columnist for economic issues in the regional edition of "Corriere della Sera", where he published more than 300 articles. Later he has been actively involved with various newspapers on economic and social issues. Since 2015, he has a personal page on Il Fatto Quotidiano online.

He has organized numerous scientific and outreach initiatives at the University of Verona and the University of Valle d'Aosta, where he taught Economic History from 2000 to 2008. He hosted distinguished figures at the University of Verona, contributing to the cultural significance and international reputation of the institution. He believes in actions rather than appearances, and even more so in avoiding conformity for the sake of appearances.
